Improving Women's Literacy – Improving Women's Lives

Join us at 7:00 p.m. on March 8 for our interactive Zoom program featuring Mary Taylor, Executive Director of **Literacy Volunteers of Bangor**. Mary has led LVB since 2003. She has a Master's degree in communication studies from the University of Maine and a certification in Volunteer Administration, and she is a nationally certified poverty coach. Mary is passionate about the connection between literacy, poverty, and culture because they were part of her own life. She grew up in northern Maine in a French speaking community. Despite selling insurance for Met Life, her grandfather was illiterate until Mary's mother taught him to read using the *Bangor Daily News*. As a young woman, she had an unplanned pregnancy and became a single mom. She credits her family's support for enabling her to complete her college education and to escape long-term poverty for her and her son.

That deep understanding of and passion for addressing the problems of low literacy, poverty, and cultural diversity brought her to Literacy Volunteers of Bangor twenty years ago. She has taken it from a small organization to one with 200-300 volunteers helping between 200 and 300 local adults improve their literacy and their lives every year. Mary will discuss how improving literacy has improved the lives of countless women and their families over the last twenty years and why this work is even more important now than ever before.

International Women's Day

International Women's Day is a global holiday celebrated annually on March 8 as a focal point in the women's rights movement, bringing attention to issues such as gender equality, reproductive rights, and violence and abuse against women. The purpose of the day is to uphold women's achievements, recognize challenges, and focus greater attention on women's rights and gender equality. International days and weeks are occasions to educate the public on issues of concern, to mobilize political will and resources to address global problems, and to celebrate and reinforce achievements of humanity. The existence of international days predates the establishment of the United Nations, but the UN has embraced them as a powerful advocacy tool.

Meet Our Scholarship Recipients

We have two very deserving recipients of our non-traditional student scholarships this year, Nicole Blair and Kristen M. Cartier.

Nicole is a Social Science major at the University of Maine Augusta. Nicole left high school with honors to work in the healthcare field. Her life changed dramatically when at age 45 she became a victim of domestic violence. This left her a single mother of five and a grandmother of five. She returned to college in 2019 when family demands allowed. Nicole has continued to pursue her education and currently teaches pre-school to support her family and her education. When she graduates in the spring of 2023, she plans to go on to graduate school in trauma management.

Kristen is enrolled in UMA's mental health/human services bachelor of science program. She is currently attending classes online because she's needed by her elderly parents and three other family members living in Florida. By leaving Maine to help them, she lost her federal work study grant and other benefits she received due to her permanent disability. Kristen's short-term goal is to graduate with her BS in mental health and human services. Her long-term goal is to continue in her own recovery and to become an equine mental health therapist specializing in grief, trauma, and addiction.

Both Nicole and Kristen have agreed to speak at our annual meeting in May.
