# Things Are Cooking: What's Hot with Gender Justice in the Maine Legislature

Our branch will meet by zoom on Wednesday, December 6 at 7:00 p.m. We'll begin with a presentation by Destie Hohman Sprague, Executive Director of the Maine Women's Lobby (MWL), who will talk about successes in the past legislative session and priorities for advocacy in the upcoming session. Destie has been with MWL since 2020, following eleven years as Associate Director of the Maine Coalition Against Sexual Assault. She is passionate about organizational infrastructure, policies, and practices which reflect anti-oppression and feminist values, and she is committed to ensuring that the Lobby and its Education Fund are part of creating a Maine free from misogyny and gender-based discrimination. Following Destie's presentation Lee Davis will facilitate a brief Q&A period. After a short break we'll continue with a business meeting. #### **AAUW of Maine Council**

We have officially named officers and branch representatives to the new AAUW of Maine Council, which meets bi-monthly to conduct state business and stay connected with the branches and other women's organizations. Carolyn MacRae of Waterville is serving as Administrator for a year; other elected officers are Helene Maraghy, Finance Chair; Kristin Sweeney, Funds Chair; Beth Clark, Program and Public Policy Chair; Betty-Jane Meader, Membership Chair; and Martha Arterberry, Communications Chair. The committees have one member from each branch. I represent Penobscot Valley Branch on the Council and also serve on Program and Public Policy. Fran Haines serves on Membership, and Susan Landry is our representative on Communications.

The Council intends to collaborate with other organizations, including the Maine Women's Lobby, and Carolyn MacRae met with Destie Hohman Sprague, Executive Director, in September. Destie will speak to our branch on December 6 about their work and how AAUW can advocate for women in Augusta. Carolyn met also with the President of the one remaining AAUW New Hampshire branch, Liz McMillan, and discussed having them join us for our state convention in the spring.

The full Council met November 9 and heard reports from the committees. Penobscot Valley Branch has 21 members. Betty-Jane also reported that we have 7 institutions of higher education who have joined as College-University Partners. UMaine is one of the seven, and the others are Colby, NMCC, SMCC, Thomas College, UMA, and USM.

We also discussed the spring 2024 state convention. Program and Public Policy Chair Beth Clark will take the Council's suggestions back to the committee with a goal of identifying date, location, and theme by the next Council meeting on January 11, 2024.
